

# MEDIA RELEASE WEDNESDAY 21 JUNE 2017 64<sup>TH</sup> SYDNEY FILM FESTIVAL COMPLETE FOXTEL MOVIES AUDIENCE AWARD ANNOUNCED

The 64<sup>th</sup> Sydney Film Festival wrapped on Sunday 18 June with the Australian premiere screening of Bong Joon-ho's *Okja* at the State Theatre.

Today the Festival announced the **Foxtel Movies Audience Awards**, the list of the people's top five film favourites, and the top spots in both categories went to Australian films. Winner for best narrative feature went to **Ali's Wedding** directed by **Jeffrey Walker**; and winner for best documentary went to **Roller Dreams** directed by **Kate Hickey**.

**Sydney Film Festival CEO Leigh Small** said, "This year again, the Festival exceeded previous attendance figures – a continuing ten-year trend. There was an average of 72% capacity across all sessions with almost 185,000 attendances. This result marks a fitting end to Chris Freeland's eight year tenure as chairman; during which the number of people attending the Sydney Film Festival almost doubled."

"The Foxtel Movies Audience Awards are the people's choice awards, and the winners reflect the most popular films at the Festival," said **Sydney Film Festival Director Nashen Moodley.** 

"It is our delight to report that Sydney Film Festival audiences have spoken, with 20,000 votes revealing two Australian films as the winners of the feature and documentary categories in the Foxtel Movies Audience Awards."

"This year Ali's Wedding and Roller Dreams, two wonderful films that both take on remarkable true stories, have clearly made a strong impact on audiences."

"The Festival has premiered some fantastic Australian films this year. This result shows the popularity of Australian cinema at the Sydney Film Festival," he said.

"The NSW Government would like to congratulate Chris Freeland, Nashen Moodley, Leigh Small and all of the 64th Sydney Film Festival team, including the hundreds of volunteers, on delivering the most diverse and immersive year yet," said **Minister for the Arts, Don Harwin.** 

"It is fantastic to know that the highlights of the Festival will be seen across regional NSW as part of the Travelling Film Festival, and we look forward to the return of the festival for its 65th year under new Chair Deanne Weir."

"Everybody's Sydney Film Festival experience is different. We all chart our own journeys through this incredible program. But the thing I found so lovely about this year's Sydney Film Festival was that feeling of togetherness, social connection and community that emerged. It's those moments of connection that make Sydney Film Festival so special," said **City of Sydney Councillor Jess Scully, representing the Lord Mayor of Sydney.** 













Nine feature films and two shorts from this year's Festival will premiere in Newcastle this weekend when the Travelling Film Festival brings *Ali's Wedding, My Life as a Zucchini, Pop Aye, Ingrid Goes West, The Teacher, I Am Not Your Negro, Holy Air, We Don't Need a Map* (SFF Opening Night 2017), to Tower Cinemas from Friday 23 – Sunday 25 June.

# **OTHER 2017 SYDNEY FILM FESTIVAL AWARD WINNERS INCLUDE:**

**On Body and Soul**, directed by **Ildikó Enyedi**, was awarded **Sydney Film Festival**'s the prestigious 10th anniversary **Sydney Film Prize**, from a selection of 12 Official Competition films, at the Festival's Closing Night Gala.













Sydney filmmakers Sascha Ettinger Epstein and Claire Haywood were awarded the **Documentary Australia Foundation Award for Australian Documentary**, a \$10,000 cash prize, for *The Pink House*.

The **Dendy Awards for Australian Short Films** were announced; awarding *Adele*, directed by Mirene Igwabi. Sunday Emerson Gullifer was Highly Commended for her short film *Tomorrow*, *and tomorrow*, *and tomorrow*. And Daniel Agdag's animation *Lost Property Office* took out both the \$7,000 Rouben Mamoulian Award for Best Director and the \$5,000 Yoram Gross Animation Award.

The Event Cinema Australian Short Screenplay Award was awarded to stop motion animation After All by Michael Cusack, who received a \$5,000 cash prize, with a special mention to the writers of Screenability short film The Milky Pop Kid, Johanna Garvin and Emily Dash.

The \$10,000 Sydney-UNESCO City of Film Award, bestowed by Create NSW to a trail-blazing NSW-based screen practitioner, went to Indigenous Australian actor, director and writer **Leah Purcell**.

From **Wednesday 7 June** to **Sunday 18 June 2017**, the 64<sup>th</sup> Sydney Film Festival offers Sydneysiders another exciting season of cinema amidst a whirlwind of premieres, red-carpet openings, in-depth discussions, international guests and more.

Sydney Film Festival also presents an Official Competition of 12 films that vie for the Sydney Film Prize, a highly respected honour that awards a \$60,000 cash prize based on the decision of a jury of international and Australian filmmakers and industry professionals. Previous Sydney Film Prize winners: Aquarius (2016); Arabian Nights (2015); Two Days, One Night (2014); Only God Forgives (2013); Alps (2012); A Separation (2011); Heartbeats (2010); Bronson (2009); and Hunger (2008).
