

# SYDNEY FILM FESTIVAL ANNOUNCES KOREA ON THE VERGE: SOCIAL FAULTLINES IN KOREAN CINEMA

The 63<sup>rd</sup> Sydney Film Festival today announces a new program of contemporary Korean cinema – Korea on the Verge: Social Faultlines in Korean Cinema. Five Korean films will be presented by the Festival.

"Korean cinema remains in many ways the liveliest in East Asia, but the program has gone a little offmainstream in our selection for Korea on the Verge," said **guest programmer Tony Rayns**. "These edgy, combative films by fearless indie filmmakers don't paper over the cracks in Korean society, but expand them into social faultlines!"

Rayns is a London-based filmmaker and critic known for his expertise in East Asian cinema having written for the underground publication *Cinema Rising*, and the *Monthly Film Bulletin* from its 1970 issue until its demise in 1991. He has also written for *Sight & Sound* since the 1970s.

Through this specially curated selection of films, audiences will get a snapshot of some of Korea's most exciting indie filmmakers. The five important stories explore political scandals, social injustices, sexual deviances and re-examined traditions.

*Alice in Earnestland* (Best Korean Feature, Jeonju 2015), is this decade's answer to Korea's blackest comedies, a one woman versus the system political satire that is often truly scary. *Non Fiction Diary*, Jung Yoon-suk's prize-winning documentary-style film essay, is an investigation of freedom and social control, starting with the capture of Korea's notorious serial killers, the Jijon Gang, in 1994.

**A Fish**, Park Hong-min's superbly shot (in homemade 3D, even the subtitles are in 3D!) first feature film, is a neo-noir mystery involving murder, shamanism, a violent private eye and an increasingly deranged teacher. **Love and...** from Chinese-Korean director Zhang Lu is a four-chapter conundrum featuring three top Korean stars: Park Hae-il, Ahn Sung-ki, Moon So-ri.

*Stateless Things* from Kim Kyung-mook compares two ways of being 'stateless' when an illegal immigrant from North Korea meets a sexual outlaw.

From Wednesday 8 June to Sunday 19 June 2016, the 63<sup>rd</sup> Sydney Film Festival offers Sydneysiders another exciting season of cinema amidst a whirlwind of premieres, red-carpet openings, in-depth discussions, international guests and more. Each year the Festival's programming team curates 12 days of cinema sourced from world-famous film festivals, including Cannes, Sundance, Toronto and the Berlinale; as well as Australia's finest productions.

Sydney Film Festival also presents an Official Competition of 12 films that vie for the Sydney Film Prize, a highly respected honour that awards a \$60,000 cash prize based on the decision of a jury of international and Australian filmmakers and industry professionals. Previous Sydney Film Prize winners are: Arabian Nights (2015); Two Days, One Night (2014); Only God Forgives (2013); Alps (2012); A Separation (2011); Heartbeats (2010); Bronson (2009); and Hunger (2008).
