Sydney Film Festival, 6-17 June, announces full list of Talks and Q&A sessions

The 59th Sydney Film Festival is proud to announce the full program of over 90 talks and Q&A sessions to be hosted by filmmakers, writers, actors and industry guests across 7 venues over 12 days. There will be over 15 free talks and more than 75 screenings with filmmaker introductions and post-film Q&As at this year's festival.

"We are really pleased to have this amazing line-up of talks and Q&A sessions featuring an extensive array of filmmakers at the Sydney Film Festival this year," said Nashen Moodley, SFF Festival Director. "We encourage festivalgoers to take advantage of these sessions which we hope will enhance their experience of the films."

This year's free talks programs encompass the Meet the Filmmakers: SFF Talks at the Apple Store, the Expert Talks at the Sydney Film Festival Hub @ Lower Town Hall as well as the lan McPherson Memorial Lecture.

Highlights of the SFF Talks at the Apple Store include Cate Shortland discussing her World War II drama, Lore; and a discussion of Dead Europe by director Tony Krawitz (The Tall Man), Oscar®winning producer **Emile Sherman** (*The King's Speech*) and producer **Liz Watts** (*Animal Kingdom*).

The Expert Talks: Festival Hub @ Lower Town Hall program features the AFTRS Presents Five Films for an Alien panel discussion featuring directors Kriv Stenders (Red Dog) and Bruce Beresford (Mao's Last Dancer), screenwriter John Collee (Happy Feet) and Screen Australia CEO Dr. Ruth Harley; and the Confessions of a Festival Photographer talk by Fabrizio Maltese, amongst others.

In addition, the 2012 Ian McPherson Memorial Lecture will feature Bryan Brown in discussion with David Stratton on movies and moviemaking. The lan McPherson Memorial Lecture is a free public event presented every year, commemorating the contribution of the man who helped establish Sydney Film Festival in 1954 and who served on the Festival Board until 1977.

Highlights of the introductions and Q&A sessions held at screenings include: Billy Connolly at Disney•Pixar's Brave; Sarah Snook, Ryan Corr and director Peter Templeman at the World Premiere of SFF Opening Night film Not Suitable for Children; and Bonita Mabo, actors Deborah Mailman and Jimi Bani and filmmakers Rachel Perkins and Darren Dale at the World Premiere of Mabo.

For a different type of filmmaker interaction, SFF has also organised a lunch at the Grasshopper Eating House and Bar with two special SFF guests, Musa Syeed, screenwriter and director of Valley of the Saints and Miro Bilbrough, screenwriter and director of the Australian feature Being Venice.

Many of his films were banned by state television channels in India, Patwardhan successfully challenged the censorship rulings in court. Interviewing Anand Patwardhan is Tom Zubrycki, who has earned an international reputation for his substantial and widely-respected body of Australian documentaries, tackling diverse issues from immigration and racial predjudice to civil unrest and unionism. Stephen Maing in conversation with Joost den Hartog Saturday 9 June, 5-6pm

Catch filmmaker **Stephen Maing** in conversation with **Joost den Hartog**, Executive Director of the Australian International Documentary Conference (AIDC). **Stephen Maing** is a Korean-American filmmaker and artist based in New York. He is the director of several award-winning short films, as well as co-producer and editor of the feature documentary *Lioness*. He received a 2009 Creative Promise Award Honorable Mention at the Tribeca Film Festival and the Special Jury Prize at the 2012 Independent Film Festival of Boston. Stephen brings to Sydney Film Festival his new feature documentary shot in China, *High Tech, Low Life*, which looks at decentralized media and the conflict between personal and political identity.

Before joining AIDC, **Joost den Hartog** was the producer of the Forum for International Co-Financing in Amsterdam. He also worked for the Toronto Documentary Forum and has been involved with AIDC since 2005, first as marketplace coordinator and since 2006 as Executive Director.

Oliver Hermanus and Tony Krawitz

Catch South African filmmaker **Oliver Hermanus** (**Beauty**) in conversation with acclaimed Australian director **Tony Krawitz** (**Dead Europe**).

Oliver Hermanus studied film at the University of Cape Town, UC Santa Barbara and the London Film School. His debut feature *Shirley Adams* appeared at the Locarno International Film Festival in 2009 and has subsequently been screened in over a dozen countries (including SFF2010). His new film **Beauty** premiered in Un Certain Regard at the 2011 Cannes Film Festival, where it won the Queer Palm.

Interviewing **Oliver Hermanus** is acclaimed Australian director Tony Krawitz (*Jewboy, The Tall Man*). His latest film **Dead Europe** premieres in Official Competition at SFF. Presented in association with the Australian Directors Guild.

Author **Martha Ansara** and featured cinematographers will be signing copies of the Australian Cinematographers Society's newly published photographic book *The Shadowcatchers: A History of Australian Cinematography*.

The Cinema According to Bertolucci Friday 15 June, 5-7pm

The free screening of Gianni Amelio's 1976 documentary is followed by a discussion with scholar and Italian cinema specialist **Dr. Andrea Rizzi**.

Gianni Amelio's fascinating documentary *The Cinema according to Bertolucci* imaginatively explores the making of Bertolucci's political epic, *1900* and screens in SFF's Bertolucci retrospective. Amelio interviews Bertolucci between takes from key scenes featuring Robert De Niro, Gérard Depardieu and Donald Sutherland, as the director explains his desire to 'speak of the land where [he] was born and the most formative time of [his] life.' In a memorable on-set interview, a Hemingway-esque Sterling Hayden, dressed in character as peasant patriarch Leo Dalcò and sporting a complexion like 'overcooked bread' (according to his director), poetically ruminates on the 'beauty, depth and mystery' of Bertolucci's filmmaking process. It's 'probably the most probing and intimate record of Bertolucci at work,' according to *Cinehouse UK*.
