The 65th Sydney Film Festival today announced the return of Screenability, an exciting platform for screen practitioners with disability, in partnership with Create NSW and the NSW Department of Family and Community Services.

Screenability will showcase six cutting edge works at this year's 6-17 June event – documentary films *The Sign for Love* and *Stuttering – My Constant Companion* and short films *Broken, Intimate Encounters 20 Years On, Tip of My Tongue,* and *To Know Him –* all made by filmmakers with disability.

Attending the Festival to introduce their films will be: Australian filmmakers with disability Stevie Cruz-Martin (*Broken*), Dieter Knierim (*Intimate Encounters 20 Years On*), and Samia Halabi (*Tip Of My Tongue*), and Israeli filmmakers with disability **Elad Cohen** and **Iris Ben Moshe** (*The Sign for Love*), and Austria's **Birgit Gohlke** and **Petra Nickel** (*Stuttering – My Constant Companion*).

These guests will also discuss opportunities for filmmakers with disability at a Meet the Filmmakers session at AFTRS (Saturday, 16 June, 4:15pm). All Screenability filmmaker introductions and Q&As will be Auslan interpreted.

"The Festival's Screenability strand will showcase works by filmmakers with disability from Australia, Israel, the UK and Sweden. The diversity of the disability story is beautifully presented in these films, leading us inside another world with authentic storytelling. Programming these films has been an exciting process, revealing a depth of talent creating startling and provocative cinema," said **Sydney Film Festival's Screenability Programmer Sofya Gollan**.

"From an exploration of voices as the most distinct representation of who we are; to a deaf woman fighting for her lover's body to say goodbye; to a deaf man's fight to win the respect of his loved ones, these films, made by those with lived experience of disability, are boldly breathe new life into storytelling," she said.

"The Festival will also feature the World Premiere of the three Screenability Film Fund films. With stories of a young Muslim teenager rekindling a childhood friendship; a relationship's breakdown; and a short documentary about the consequences of a provocative exhibition, 20 years later, these films are incredibly diverse," she said.

For the second year, the Festival maintains its inclusion policy, with audio described and open captioned screenings, and a relaxed screening (*Maya the Bee: The Honey Games*, 1:00pm on 17 June) to complement the Festival's program, which includes over 80 English-subtitled films.

Screenability at the Sydney Film Festival is part of a suite of initiatives by Create NSW designed to











Screen Australia boost the participation of underrepresented groups in the screen industry. The focus of Screenability is to grow participation with a wide range of industry professionals, showcasing films by filmmakers with disability in a festival context.

Grainne Brunsdon, Acting Executive Director for Create NSW said, "Last year's inaugural Screenability series was a sell-out success and this year we are delighted to premiere three new captivating films from some incredibly talented filmmakers across the State."

"Creating more opportunities for Australians with disabilities in the screen industry is what our Screenability commitment is all about and along with finding paid-for placements for creatives across the sector, we are immensely proud of the achievements to date. We can't wait for audiences to see this year's line-up of films," she said.

"People with disability will see themselves and their experiences reflected in a purposeful way at one of the world's longest running film festivals for the second year running," said **Minister for Disability Services, the Hon. Raymond Williams**.

"Screening great films by Australian and international film makers with disability teaches us to see the people and their abilities beyond their conditions, increasing visibility and awareness, while also promoting career opportunities in filmmaking for people with disability," he said.
