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SYDNEY FILM FESTIVAL HUB: PARTIES, TALKS AND CINEMATIC EXPERIENCES CELEBRATE 70 YEARS OF SFF

From film-themed dance parties to trivia nights, filmmaker talks and a special SFF Archive Exhibition: Celebrating 70 years of the Festival, the Sydney Film Festival Hub will once again play host to a series of immersive Festival experiences.

The Hub will be open to the public throughout the Festival (8-18 June), and from 11:30am on weekends and public holiday Monday. The Hub features a Happy Hour special at its pop-up bar between 4:30pm and 6:00pm on weekdays with exclusive offerings from **Brix Rum Distillery**, **Château Tanunda**, **Lyres** and **Mountain Goat Beer**, as well as a unique Brix Mai Tai cocktail, celebrating SFF's 70th birthday.

Keep that post-film buzz going with special events paired with screenings to celebrate cinema. Experience the swinging '60s at the **Film Tracks: Hairspray Party**, where DJs spin '60s tracks and gogo dancers groove inspired by and paired with a new restoration of the John Waters' classic; or dive into an evening of magic, music, and occult-inspired delights at the **Late Night Party with the Devil** to celebrate all things that go bump-in-the-cinema alongside the Australian premiere of new Aussie horror flick *Late Night With the Devil*.

The Festival Talks at The Hub create a space for audiences, filmmakers and industry professionals to progress a dialogue about the important topics and issues of the year, addressed in Festival films. Highlights include the launch of **Sustainable Screens Australia**, a panel discussion with five filmmakers from **Europe! Voices of Women in Film** program, and a host of in-conversation style talks with the likes of **Warwick Thornton**, **Jane Campion**, **Rachel Ward**, legendary Korean filmmaker **Kim Jee-Woon**, and *Dark Emu* author **Bruce Pascoe**.

To celebrate 70 years of Sydney Film Festival, a special SFF Archive Exhibition of the Festival's history will be on display at The Hub. Visitors can explore the remarkable SFF treasures, stories and keepsakes, witnessing the evolution of an iconic and internationally renowned film festival.

"The Hub serves as the beating heart of the Festival, a place where film enthusiasts and devotees can revel in the diverse wealth of wisdom, expertise and perspectives brought forth by filmmakers and seasoned professionals of the industry," said **Festival Director Nashen Moodley**. Korean Cinema Celebration: Geonbae! Open to all, and a perfect companion following the screening of *A Wild Roomer* at Event Cinemas George St with director Lee Jeong-hong.
